As a result of the implementation of the 1% Sales and Use tax, the City of Weirton has collected \$2,693,058 in revenues for the period July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018. These Funds have enabled the City of Weirton to make additional contributions to the Police and Fire pensions which are grossly under-funded. In addition, the City of Weirton was also able to provide additional funds for street paving.
