We have had success with on-site citations and continue to cite residents that ignore warnings. We have had no success in trying to place a tax lien on the property. See narrative in "lessons learned" below. The on-site citations helps with persons that live in the area to help remediate un-kept and vacant properties. After receiving a small grant, we called "Good Neighbor Grant" which was used toward persons that met criteria to help pay for disposal of waste. The City saw success in this as well and have budgeted city funds to continue this practice. Threat of citation give incentive to clean up and grant helps those that struggle financially. Resident is more apt to clean up the property.
<b>LESSONS LEARNED</b> — In the space below, please provide a brief narrative highlighting lessons learned during implementation of this revenue initiative that would benefit other municipalities.
Tax liens have proven to be challenging. The Upshur County Assessor will not place the liens on the property taxes because Software Solutions, the company that controls the tax software will not recognize this as a tax lien. Until they are directed to do so in writing by state law or State Auditor the liens will not be recognized or placed on the property. The City of Buckhannon has lost several thousand dollars. The City of Buckhannon has placed liens on properties, but if the property is sold at a tax sale our liens are not recognized either. Last year two representatives from the city bid on

properties that had city liens. It appears the city will own those properties, which will be remedied and

sold. Profits will be used toward continued property remediation.

B&O was reduced. In addition to the already existing \$1,000.000.00 exemption, the tiered rates were reduced from \$0.25 per hundred to \$0.20 per hundred and \$0.50 per hundred to \$0.45 per hundred. Received \$221,243 Apr 2020; \$451,640 July 2020; \$467,636 Oct 2020; The City expected approximately \$1.2 million per year in revenues.
SUCCESSES – In the space below, please provide a brief narrative highlighting projects, improvements, programming, etc. realized through the implementation of this revenue initiative and any metrics used to track performance.  In May 2020, City Council approved the purchase of an old bank drive thru that had not been actively utilized for a few years. This property is directly across from our downtown Jawbone Park. Jawbone Park is used frequently for public functions. The bank property includes a small building. It is also located in a floodplain and has underground utilities, which made challenges to prospective buyers. Thoughts are to eventually use the lot in relationship to Jawbone Park. \$200,000 of sales tax revenue was used for this purchase.  For fiscal year budget 2020-21, Council allocated \$954,000 for equipment purchases, infrastructure projects and \$150,000 will go toward Storm Water projects. \$132,000 toward Police equipment (includes K9 unit new cruisers) \$104,000 toward Fire Dept (includes new fire truck payment, drone thermal camera), \$567,000 toward Street Department (includes new concrete truck, new loader, several paving and street projects). \$20,000 toward City's Youth Center (included software, fire alarm upgrade)

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
