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

On April 13, 2015, Ordinance No. 1786, Creating Probationary Employment of Uncertified Building Officials was enacted.

The implementation of this initiative allowed the City to hire and train Probationary Building Inspectors that enforce the International Property Maintenance Code while waiting to pass certification examinations.

The addition of Probationary Building Inspectors allows the department to effectively manage property maintenance violations, conduct inspections for new construction projects, and perform the required inspections associated with the City’s Rental Registration Program.

LESSONS LEARNED – In the space below, please provide a brief narrative highlighting lessons learned during implementation of this initiative that would benefit other municipalities.

The West Virginia State Fire Marshal implemented a two-year provisional license for uncertified Code Officials, Inspectors, and/or Plans Examiners so as to allow said officials, inspectors, or examiners time to obtain the necessary licensing needed to become certified.

Should the West Virginia State Fire Marshal discontinue its provisional licensing, Ordinance 1786 will allow the City to maintain its probationary Building Inspector program, enabling new hires to work while completing the necessary certification requirements..

Through this initiative, Code Officials have issued hundreds of citations for common nuisance conditions. By authorizing Code Officials to assess fines directly through citations, the number of cases requiring Municipal Court action has significantly decreased, as many property owners now correct the violations and pay the fines prior to their scheduled court dates.

The City remains able to effectively resolve recurring nuisance issues by issuing written citations or serving summonses, without prior notification, to property owners or tenants with repeated violations.

On August 24, 2015, Ordinance No. 1791, Authorizing the City of Weirton to Submit Municipal Home Rule Plan Amendment to the West Virginia Municipal Home Rule Board – Proposed Amendment # 1 – Municipal Sales Tax was enacted.

On February 17, 2016, Ordinance No. 1987, Ordinance Imposing Municipal Sales and Service Tax and Municipal Use Tax in Accordance with West Virginia Code § 8-1-5a was enacted.

The total 1% Sales Tax collected for the period of July 1, 2016, through October 21, 2025, is \$27,589,329.56. At the initiative’s onset, the pensions for police and fire were severely underfunded, and, while still underfunded, significant progress continues to be made toward full funding.

SUCSESSES – In the space below, please provide a brief narrative highlighting projects, improvements, programming, etc. realized through the implementation of this revenue initiative and any metrics used to track performance.

With the police and fire pension funds being severely underfunded, the City was saddled with a large financial challenge. To date, the Police Pension is 40% funded and the Fire Pension is 89.3% funded. Approximately 65% of the Sales Tax is being used to make the required contributions to the pension funds.

On February 11, 2019, City Council passed Ordinance No. 2057 amending our Home Rule Plan to authorize the sale of alcoholic beverages by Class "A" license holders beginning at 10:00 AM on Sundays. This amendment to our Home Rule Plan was approved by the Home Rule Board on April 16, 2019.

In 2019, WV SB 561 was passed allowing the sale of alcoholic beverages beginning at 10:00 AM on Sundays. Should WV SB 561 be rescinded, Council passed Ordinance No. 2116 implementing the sale of alcoholic beverages by Class "A" license holders beginning at 10:00 AM on Sundays. Ordinance No. 2116 was approved on January 13, 2020.
